

CALL FOR PAPERS:

AFRICAN PUBLIC PROCUREMENT LAW JOURNAL

The **African Public Procurement Law Journal** was established to stimulate and foster academic engagement and debate in the field of public procurement law and regulation on the African continent. The Journal is the first platform devoted exclusively to research into public procurement law in Africa and will be published with open access online by the African Public Procurement Regulation Research Unit of the Faculty of Law, Stellenbosch University, South Africa.

The Journal will publish contributions online on a continuous basis and in consolidated form twice a year – in June and December. It will publish high quality papers on themes and sub-themes relevant to procurement law and regulation in Africa. The Journal intends to make widely accessible, information on African public procurement law, regulation and policy and provide readers with scholarly and in-depth analysis on the same. The Journal is aimed at a diverse audience of academics, practitioners, regulators, policy makers, government officials and students.

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An editorial board consisting of internationally distinguished scholars in public procurement regulation will provide oversight over the work of the editorial committee.

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All submissions to the Journal must adhere to the Style guide and must be submitted online on the journal website at <http://applj.journals.ac.za>.

The Journal particularly welcomes submissions from academics and practitioners with an interest in any area of public procurement law, policy and regulation. The Journal will only consider articles which comply with the Style guide.

All contributions must be critical and provide analysis of legal information on any area of public procurement relevant to Africa. All papers will be subjected to a blind peer review process by African and international public procurement experts. Articles that are merely descriptive of the law will not be considered for publication. The Journal publishes the following categories of papers:

- Articles: Critical Analyses of topical themes drawing on public procurement policy, law, regulation and development.
- Book Reviews: Critical assessments of new books or reports that are related to public procurement policy, law and regulation.
- Shorter Notes and case commentaries: Intellectually motivated commentary on any public procurement related adjudication or other topical issue.

Authors are required to register on the journal website before submitting a contribution.
