Stellenbosch University

Starting out with four faculties (Science, Education, Arts and Social Sciences, and AgriSciences), 503 students and 40 lecturing staff on 2 April 1918, Stellenbosch University today is home to 10 faculties, a vibrant and cosmopolitan community of more than 30 000 students and 3 000 staff members, spread over five campuses. The historical oak-lined university town is situated amongst the Boland Mountains in the winelands of the Western Cape. This creates a unique campus atmosphere, which attracts local and foreign students alike. On the main campus, paved walkways wind between campus buildings - some dating from previous centuries; others just a few years old. Architecture from various eras attests to the sound academic foundation and establishment of an institution of excellence. This, together with the scenic beauty of the area; state-of-the-art, environmentally friendly facilities and technology, as

well as visionary thinking about the creation of a sustainable 21st-century institution, make for the unique character of Stellenbosch University.

Academic excellence and innovation The University is amongst South Africa's leading tertiary institutions based on research output, student pass rates and rated scientists, and is recognised internationally as an academic institution of excellence. It consistently boasts amongst the highest weighted research output per full-time academic staff member of all South African universities and the second-highest number of scientists in South Africa who have been rated by the National Research Foundation (NRF). It also has the highest student success rate in the country.

The current Rector and Vice-Chancellor is Prof Wim de Villiers.

The current Chancellor is Justice Edwin Cameron. He is the 15th Chancellor of Stellenbosch University and alumnus of the Law Faculty.

Faculties and campuses

SU has ten faculties: AgriSciences, Economic and Management Sciences, Medicine and Health Sciences, Engineering, Military Sciences, Arts and Social Sciences, Science, Education, Law and Theology. The Faculties are spread over different campuses and the Faculty of Law is situated at the Stellenbosch campus. Stellenbosch is situated about 50 km from Cape Town and just 30 km from Cape Town International Airport.

Faculty of Law

The Ou Hoofgebou (Old Main Building) is home to the Stellenbosch Law Faculty and is situated on the corner of Victoria and Ryneveld Streets in the centre of Stellenbosch.

The Faculty of Law was established in 1921 and initially the Faculty only offered the LLB degree and focused on training and equipping students, not merely as legal practitioners, but also as jurists.

Today the Faculty offers the following undergraduate programmes to around 1200 students:

BAcc LLB

This unique combined 5 year degree is only offered at Stellenbosch. Students are introduced to both the essentials of jurisprudence, as well as Financial Accounting, Management Accounting, Tax and Auditing. Graduates satisfy the academic requirements to commence with the professional training to become an attorney, advocate or chartered accountant.

BA (Law)

A three year degree that enriches one's understanding of languages, human behaviour and social issues, while providing a basis for further legal study by providing entry to the 2 year LLB.

BCom (Law)

A three year degree that is business orientated and combines commerce with law. It is ideal for students who are interested in commercial law or a career in the business sector and it provides an entry to the 2 year LLB.

LLB as first degree

A four year professional degree that focuses mainly on law. This programme aims to provide students with a sound grasp of all branches of law essential for a career as a legal practitioner.



LLB as second degree

A two year degree that can be completed by BA (Law) or BCom (Law) graduates or a three year degree for Bachelor graduates from any other field of study.

The Faculty recruits academically strong and an increasingly more diverse cohort of students from South Africa and abroad. All SU law programmes have stringent admission and selection criteria. Innovative research, excellent lecturers, good facilities and a writing-across-the-curriculum teaching strategy prepare students for postgraduate studies, a career in the legal profession, in business or in the public sector.

Student opportunities

The Juridical Society, Moot Court Society, Students for Law and Social Justice, Responsa Meridiana and the Law and Leadership short course are just some of the student initiatives within the Faculty.

The Faculty of Law actively promotes and participates in exchange agreements that exist between the Faculty and different individual institutions.

Postgraduate Programmes

The LLM degree (by thesis) was awarded in 1976 for the first time to two students. The Law Faculty introduced the LLM by course work in 1994. Today the Faculty offers the following **postgraduate programmes** to around 220 students:

Postgraduate Diploma in Tax Law

A two year programme aimed at law, accounting and commerce graduates focusing on the interpretation of tax law.

Postgraduate Diploma in Intellectual Property Law

A one year programme aimed at law, science and engineering graduates focusing on Copyright Law, Trademark Law and Patent Law.

Postgraduate Diploma in Public Procurement Policy and Regulation

A one year programme aimed at graduates with an interest in public procurement focusing on public procurement policy, compliance, corruption, as well as infrastructure and defence procurement.

Master of Laws (LLM) by course work

A one year programme where students can follow the general programme or can enrol for one of the specialisations, namely Alternative Dispute Resolution, Intellectual Property Law, International Trade Law, Labour Law or Public Procurement Law. The programme requires students to complete 4 taught modules and 1 research paper of around 15 000 words.

Master of Laws (LLM) by research

A one year programme where students are required to complete a thesis of around 60 000 words under supervision of a specialist in the relevant area of law.

Doctor of Laws (LLD)

A two year programme where students are required to complete a dissertation of around 100 000 words under supervision of a specialist in the relevant area of law.

Graduates of the Faculty include leading judges, advocates, attorneys, business people, politicians and academics.

Staff

The staff of the Faculty of Law is passionate about legal education, research and social impact.

37 academics and 19 administrative staff supported by postdoctoral fellows and extraordinary appointments 14 National Research Foundation (NRF) rated researchers (1A, 6B, 5C, 2Y) that signify their international and national esteem as researchers. There is currently only 3 A-rated researchers in the field of Law in South Africa.

Stellenbosch University is engaged in several international consortia and has an extensive network of collaborators. Active cooperation agreements exist with several leading Faculties of Law, including Aberdeen, Amsterdam, Bucerius, Leiden, KU Leuven, Maastricht, and Utrecht. A new joint Stellenbosch-KU Leuven LLM programme starts in 2020.



Administrative Staff

The Faculty is home to 4 research chairs, namely:

The HF Oppenheimer Chair in Human Rights

Professor Sandra Liebenberg is the incumbent of the Chair. She is an internationally renowned scholar in the field of socio-economic rights. She served as Chair of the expert committee advising the SA Constitutional Assembly on the Bill of Rights in the 1996 Constitution.

The Anton Mostert Chair in Intellectual Property Law

Professor Sadulla Karjiker is the incumbent of the Chair. He is an admitted attorney in South Africa and a solicitor in England, and has practised in corporate and commercial law in both jurisdictions. He also worked for a UK legal publisher on its technology related projects.

The Law Faculty Trust Chair in Social Justice

Professor Thuli Madonsela is the first incumbent of the Chair. Named one of TIME100's most influential people in the world in 2014 and Forbes Africa Person of the Year 2016, Prof Madonsela is one of the drafters of South Africa's Constitution and co-architect of several laws that have sought to anchor South Africa's democracy. She is also the former Public Protector of South Africa.

The South African Research Chair in Property Law

Professor Zsa-Zsa Boggenpoel is the incumbent of the Chair. She is an alumna of the Chair and has received a number of awards including the Vice-Rector Award for one of the researchers who made a substantial contribution toward research outputs of the University.



The LLM programme attracts the most international students. 496 degrees have been awarded to international students since 2008.

The Law Clinic

The Faculty is the home of the SU Law Clinic. The Law Clinic transitioned into a fully-fledged Legal Aid Clinic in 1987, after starting out in 1975 as a Legal Aid Scheme operated by senior law students who provided legal assistance to indigent communities of Stellenbosch.

Today the Law Clinic presents practical legal training to law students and continues to offer legal services to indigent persons. The Law Clinic assists with various civil matters, for example divorces, contracts, family law and debt. The Law Clinic also hosts workshops and provides training relating to evictions, debt collection and family violence. The Law Clinic has 650 active client files and more than 2000 individuals approach the Clinic each year for legal assistance. The staff of the Clinic consists of a Manager, 4 attorneys, 6 candidate attorneys, 2 legal consultants, 1 paralegal and 3 administrators.

Stellenbosch Law Review/Stellenbosch Regstydskrif

The Stellenbosch Law Review is an accredited law journal that was established in 1990. The journal includes full-length articles, book reviews, case discussions as well as commentaries. 3 editions are published each year and contributions are published either in English or Afrikaans. The Stellenbosch Law Review was named among the top 5 most-quoted South African law journals by the Washington & Lee School of Law: Law Journal Ranking Project in 2018. This project evaluated law journals per country based on a 2010-2017 survey.

Nicola Smit started her academic career as a junior lecturer at UNISA. She joined the University of Johannesburg (then RAU) in 1996 as a lecturer. She progressed to full professor and also served as Vice Dean, Faculty of Law of the University of Johannesburg. In 2013 she joined the North West University Faculty of Law as Executive Dean in Potchefstroom. Prof Smit has been Dean and Professor of Law of the Faculty of Law at Stellenbosch since August 2017. Her areas of specialisation include labour law (both collective and individual) and social secu-

Prof Smit states that "the Faculty is known for excellence in legal education, research and social impact. The strong relationships that the Faculty has established over many years significantly contribute to the success of our endeavours. 2021 is the centenary year of the Faculty and the Faculty is looking forward to continue working with past and present collaborators whilst also establishing new partnerships. DISTINGUISHED PROFESSORS

Prof Jacques du Plessis

Fields of specialisation: Law of Contract; Unjustified Enrichment; Comparative Law and Legal History

Jacques du Plessis is a Distinguished Professor in the Department of Private Law. He was awarded the NRF's President's Award, a B1 evaluation, an Alexander von Humboldt-Fellowship, the Toon van den Heever-medal for Legal Science and Rector's awards for excellence in research. He was awarded the *Tijdschrift voor Privaatrecht Wisselleerstoel* (Exchange Chair) at the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven for 2019.

Prof du Plessis is Vice-President of the World Society of Mixed Jurisdiction Jurists, a member of the editorial boards of a number of international law journals, and an Associate member of the International Academy of Comparative Law. He is also an Invited Fellow of the Institute for European Private Law in Maastricht, a Visiting Researcher at the Max Planck Institute for Foreign Private and Private International Law in Hamburg and a Visiting Fellow at the Institute of European and Comparative Law in Oxford. He is engaged in a number of international comparative and historical studies on the law of contract and unjustified enrichment.

Professor du Plessis is admitted as an attorney of the High Court of South Africa and obtained a Certificate in Legal Practice (cum laude) from the University of Cape Town. Prof Sandra Liebenberg BA-LLB-(UCT)-LLM [cum laude] (University of Essex, UK)-LLD-(Witwatersrand) E-mail: sliebenb@sun.ac.za

Fields of specialisation: Constitutional Law; International Human Rights Law; Socio-Economic Rights

Sandra Liebenberg is the HF Oppenheimer Chair in Human Rights Law and Distinguished Professor in the Department of Public Law. Prof Liebenberg has published widely in the field of socio-economic rights, and is the author of the monograph. Socio-Economic Rights: Adjudication under a Transformative Constitution (2010, Juta & Co) and co-editor of Law and Poverty: Perspectives from South Africa and Beyond (2011, Juta & Co). Her research and advocacy focus in the area of socio-economic rights has made a significant contribution internationally to legal scholarship on these fundamental rights. She serves on the editorial boards of several national and international human rights law journals, including the Human Rights Law Review, the Queen Mary Human Rights Law Review, the South African Journal on Human Rights, and Constitutional Court Review. In 2011 she was Distinguished African Scholar at Cornell University Law School, and JC Smith Trust Fund Distinguished Visiting Scholar, School of Law, University of Nottingham for 2014 - 2015. She serves on the staff of the Global School on Economic. Social and Cultural Rights and co-organises an annual flagship Advanced International Course on the Justiciability of Socio-Economic Rights with the Åbo Akademi Institute of Human Rights, Finland and the Norwegian Centre for Human Rights. She has also served on the drafting committee to prepare the Guidelines and Principles for Interpreting the Economic, Social and Cultural Rights in the



African Charter on Human and Peoples' Rights adopted by the African Commission on Human and Peoples' Rights.

During her time at Stellenbosch University she has been the recipient of a number of Rector's Awards, including for teaching excellence. In December 2014, she received the University of Stellenbosch's top accolade, a Chancellor's Award, for her contribution to community service in the field of law in South Africa.

She previously served as Chair of the Technical Committee advising the Constitutional Assembly on the drafting of the Bill of Rights in the 1996 Constitution of South Africa. She has been involved in a number of landmark socio-economic rights cases which have been decided in the Constitutional Court through assisting in the drafting of amici curiae (friend of the court) submissions in cases such as *Grootboom, Treatment Action Campaign, Modderklip* and *Occupiers of 51 Olivia Road.* In addition, she has served on the board of directors of a number of human rights NGOs involved in socio-economic rights advocacy and litigation, including as Chair of the Board of Directors of the Women's Legal Centre and the Socio-Economic Rights Institute of South Africa. In 1997, she founded the Socio-Economic Rights Project at the Community Law Centre (now Dullah Omar Institute, UWC) and its flagship publication, *ESR Review.*

In 2017 Prof Liebenberg was elected as a member of the United Nations Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights, the body which supervises compliance by States Parties with their obligations under the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (1966). In 2019 she was elected as Vice-Chair of the Committee. Her current research is focused on the contribution of the Covenant to developing innovative mechanisms for implementing, monitoring and adjudicating economic, social and cultural rights at a global level. She is also conducting research into the implications of the concept of sustainable development for interpreting economic, social and cultural rights in both South African and international law.

HONORARY PROFESSORS

Emeritus Justice Lourens Ackermann

Lourens Ackermann (BA, LLB, LLD (Stell), MA (Oxon)) is a honorary professor at the University of Stellenbosch and a Honorary Research Associate in the Department of Public Law, University of Cape Town. He practiced as an advocate at the Pretoria Bar from 1958 to 1980, becoming Senior Council in 1975. After a number of acting appointments from 1976 onwards, he was permanently appointed to the Transvaal Provincial Division of the Supreme Court in 1980 and served as such until September 1987. After his resignation from the Bench in 1987, he inaugurated the newly established Harry Oppenheimer Chair in Human Rights Law at the University of Stellenbosch, the first of its kind in South Africa. He held this position until the end of 1992. He also served as a judge on the Lesotho Court of Appeal and on the post-independence Namibian Supreme Court. In January 1993 he accepted reappointment to the South African Supreme Court, on the Cape of Good Hope Provincial Division bench.

In August 1994, he was appointed to the first Constitutional Court of South Africa, During his time on the Constitutional Court he chaired its library committee and has been intimately involved with developing it into what will, it is hoped, be a world-class resource. His particular field of interest is fundamental rights under the Constitution, specifically the role dignity in equality jurisprudence. In 2002, he was awarded honorary LLD by Stellenbosch University and in 2003 elected as an Honorary Fellow of Worcester College, Oxford. On retiring from service on the Constitutional Court in January 2004 he continued to participate in the development of the Constitutional Court library and for years chaired the South African Institute of

Advanced Constitutional, Public, Human Rights and International Law (SAIFAC) on Constitution Hill, Johannesburg.

Appeal Court Judge Fritz Brand

Fritz Brand studied at the Stellenbosch University and University of Leiden in the Netherlands (BA LLB LLM (cum laude)). He started his career as an academic in the Faculty of Law, Stellenbosch before he joined the Cape Bar in 1977. He practised as advocate, becoming Senior Counsel in 1989. In September 1992 he was appointed as judge in the High Court in Cape Town. After serving as acting judge of appeal at the Supreme Court of Appeal in Bloemfontein in 2000, he was appointed permanently to that court from 1 December 2001. In 2010 he was appointed as an acting judge to the Constitutional Court for two terms, retaining his permanent position on the Supreme Court of Appeal. Justice Brand always retained his interest in the academia and continued publishing, especially in the field of Defamation and Enrichment. In this capacity he has contributed to the South African Law Journal and the Law of South Africa (LAWSA) specifically. As visiting lecturer and honorary professor he has lectured in various universities and institutions, locally and abroad. When his first term as honorary professor lapsed at the end of 2016 Justice Brand accepted a further term in the Department of Private Law.

Professor Katharina Boeli-Woelki

Katharina Boeli-Woelki is the Dean of Bucerius Law School in Hamburg, Germany, She is an internationally acclaimed expert in various legal fields, including Private International Law, Comparative Law and Family Law. In this capacity she has published widely and has lectured in both the Netherlands and Germany. She is the president of the Dutch Association of Family Law, member of the board of the Dutch Association of Comparative Law, and a member of several editorial boards of Dutch. European and South African law journals. To date she received three honorary doctorates, in 2011, 2015 and 2016 respectively, from the University of Uppsala, the University of Lausanne and the University of Antwerp. She has been the President of the International Academy of Comparative Law (of which she is also a titular member) since 2014. As Honorary Professor in the Department of Private Law she presents annual training sessions and master classes in Comparative Law research methodology to Stellenbosch Law Faculty's post-graduate cohort.

Professor Christopher Forsyth

Christopher Forsyth holds a BSc and LLB from the University of Natal and a LLB and PhD from the University of Cambridge. He is a leading international scholar in the fields of Administrative Law and Private International Law. His career shows academic leadership, specifically organising the first international conference on human rights in South Africa in 1979, and involvement in collaborative publishing ventures. To this end, he authored and co-authored numerous publications including standardized authoritative textbooks across the common law world, in Private International Law and Administrative Law.

He has a long record of effective involvement at the highest level in the administration of several important public bodies. Professor Forsyth has been and is involved in working with or advising governments over constitutional issues. He is also a part-time judge, sitting as a Recorder in the Crown Court and as a Deputy High Court Judge in the Administrative Court. He has given invited evidence to many Law Commissions and Select Committee in several jurisdictions. Furthermore, he is a barrister as well as an Academic Bencher of the Inner Temple with Chambers in London and an advocate of the Supreme Court of South Africa.

Chief Justice Sandile Ngcobo

Sandile Ngcobo graduated from the University of Zululand with a BProc (Bachelor of Law), in 1975. From 1983 to 1985 he studied for an LLB at the University of Natal, Durban. In 1985, he completed an orientation course on the United States' legal system, given by the International Law Institute at the Georgetown Law Centre in Washington DC. From 1985 to 1986 he attended Harvard Law School, where he studied for an LLM. He concentrated on constitutional law, labour law, international legal process and international human rights. His career was interrupted for one year in 1976 when he was detained and held in solitary confinement following the student uprising in 1976. Upon his release, he worked briefly as a clerk in the magistrate's office, before joining the law firm of KK Mthiyane and Company in 1978, firstly an articled clerk and then as an associate attorney. In 1982, he joined the Legal Resources Centre. a public interest law firm in Durban, as a staff attorney. There he tried public-interest civil and criminal cases.

In terms of his judicial career, he has been appointed as a part-time presiding officer in the Labour court (1993); presiding officer of the Independent Election Commission's Electoral Tribunal (1994); judge of the Supreme Court of Good Hope Provisional Division (1996); judge of the Labour Appeal Court (1997). In this regard he held a dual appointment as a judge of the Supreme Court and the Labour Appeal Court. Chief Justice Ngcobo was also appointed to serve on the amnesty committee of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission in February 1998. He was then appointed as acting Judge President of the Labour Courts and Labour Appeal Court. In August 1999, he was appointed to the Constitutional Court and as Chief Justice of the Republic of South Africa in 2009, a post he held until his retirement in 2011. Upon retirement, he has been serving as Acting Judge of the Supreme Court of Namibia at the request of the President of the Republic of Namibia.

Baroness Judge Christine Van Den Wyngaert

Christine Van den Wyngaert graduated from Brussels University in 1974 and obtained a PhD in International Criminal Law in 1979. She was a professor of law at the University of Antwerp (1985-2005) where she taught criminal law, criminal procedure, comparative criminal law and international criminal law. She authored numerous publications in all these fields. Judge Van den Wyngaert was a visiting fellow at the University of Cambridge (Centre for European Legal Studies (1994–1996), Research Centre for International Law (1996 1997)) and a visiting professor at the Law Faculty of the University of Stellenbosch since 2000. Her merits as an academic were recognised in the form of five Doctorates Honoris Causa, awarded by the University of Uppsala, Sweden (2001), the University of Brussels (2010), Case Western Reserve University, Cleveland Ohio (2013), the University of Maastricht (2013) and the University of Stellenbosch (2018).

Judge Van den Wyngaert gained expertise in various governmental organisations. She was a member of the Criminal Procedure Reform Commission in Belgium (Commission Franchimont) (1991-1998) and served as an expert for the European Union in various criminal law projects. She served in the International Court of Justice as an ad hoc judge in the Arrest Warrant Case (2000-2002) and was elected as a judge in the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia (ICTY) where she served for more than five years (2003 - 2009). She served as a judge at the International Criminal Court (ICC) from 2009 till 2018, where she also presided over cases in the Appeals Division. In 2013, the Flemish Government awarded her a golden medal for her achievements in international criminal law. In 2014, she was elected Vice President of the International Association of Penal Law. Judge Van den Wyngaert was granted the title of Baroness by the King of Belgium for her merits as an academic and as an international judge.



The Faculty offers undergraduate programmes to around 1200 students and postgraduate programmes to around 220 students.

Fields of specialisation: Property Law; Constitutional Property Law; Property Theory

Zsa-Zsa Boggenpoel is a Professor in the Department of Public Law. She completed her LLD in 2010 with a dissertation entitled "Building encroachments and compulsory transfer of ownership".

Professor Boggenpoel has received numerous awards from Stellenbosch University and from universities abroad, including the Henry Arthur Holland Scholarship in Law from the University of Cambridge, London (2009), a Visiting Scholarship from the Molengraaff Institute for Private Law at Utrecht University, Netherlands (2009), the Mellon Academic Development Award from the Division for Research Development at Stellenbosch University (2014) and the Vice-Rector Award for one of the researchers who made the biggest contributions at Stellenbosch University in accredited publications, and/or supervision of postgraduate students.

She has published numerous journal articles and 1 book since commencing her academic career in 2011 and has presented nationally and internationally at conferences associated with her field of interest. She is also actively involved in postgraduate supervision of postdoctoral fellows, doctoral dissertations and masters' theses as she is passionate about the next generation of scholars tasked with the responsibility of developing the law in line with the Constitution.

In 2016, Professor Boggenpoel was awarded the NRF rating in the category Y1.

Prof Boggenpoel was promoted to full professor in the Department of Private Law at Stellenbosch University in 2017. She was awarded the South African Research Chair in Property Law (Tier 1) under the NRF: South African Research Chairs Initiative (SARChI) in March 2018.

Prof Henk Botha

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Fields of Specialisation: Constitutional Law; Constitutional Theory; Legal Philosophy; Constitutional Interpretation; Comparative Constitutional Law

Advocate Geoff Budlender

Geoff Budlender SC is a human rights advocate, practising in Cape Town, with clients ranging from the government to social justice organisations. In particular, his areas of practice and expertise include: administrative law, constitutional law, environmental law, housing and land, local government or planning, public procurement and mining. In 1979, he co-founded the Legal Resources Centre, a public interest and human rights legal service for marginalized populations in South Africa. He was the organisation's national director from 1994-1996, and led its Constitutional Litigation Unit from 2000-2004. From 1996-2000, he was director general of the Department of Land Affairs in the administration of President Nelson Mandela. He has also delivered judgments as an acting judge in the Witwatersrand Local Division, Cape Provisional Division and the Western Cape High Court. He is furthermore the author of numerous publications including, chapters in books and academic articles. He delivered the 9th Annual Human Rights Lecture, organised by the H.F. Oppenheimer Chair in Human Rights Law and the Stellenbosch University Law Faculty, which focused on how the right to equality in the Constitution could be used more effectively to address the systemic inequalities in people's access to socio-economic rights.

Professor Ockert Dupper

Ockert Dupper is the Global Programme Manager of the Vision Zero Fund (VZF) at the International Labour Organization (ILO) in Geneva, Switzerland. Launched in 2015, the VZF is an initiative of the Group of Seven (G7) countries, and is aimed at preventing work-related deaths, injuries and diseases in sectors operating in or aspiring to join global supply chains. Before joining the ILO, he was Director of Monitoring and Vice-President of Programs at the Fair Labor Association (FLA) in Washington, D.C. (2012-2014), and Professor of Law at the University of Stellenbosch (1996-2012), where he specialised in labour law and social security law. He received his BA from the University of Stellenbosch, his LLB from the University of Cape Town, and his LLM and SJD from Harvard Law School, where he was a Fulbright scholar. He also spent a year at the Harvard University Center for Ethics and the Professions as the Edmond J Safra Faculty Fellow in Ethics.

Professor Irene-Marié Esser

Irene-Marié Esser (LLB (Stell) LLM (Aberdeen) LLD (UNISA)) is a specialist in corporate law and corporate governance. She started her academic career at UNISA (2005) where she was promoted to full professor in Corporate Law in 2009. She relocated to Edinburgh, Scotland during 2013. During 2014/2015 she lectured at the University of Glasgow as well as Edinburgh University. She was appointed as a Visiting Professor at the Open University, United Kingdom during 2014, for a 3-year period. She is an expert panel member of the EU/Africa Chamber of Commerce, a member of the PRI Academic Forum as well as the Sustainable Market Actors Network & Daughters of Themis: International Network of Female Business Scholars, Professor Esser joined Glasgow Law School in September 2015 and is a Professor of Corporate Law and Governance. She is on the editorial board of the European Business Law Review. And is the current company law convener at the Society of Legal Scholars of the UK. South Africa and Scotland are mixed iurisdictions which therefore facilitates significant scope for collaboration.

Professor Charl Hugo

Charl Hugo (BA (Law) LLB (Pret), LLM (UNISA) LLD (Stell)) gualified as an attorney in 1985 and ioined the lecturing staff of the Department of Mercantile Law of Stellenbosch University in the same year. Prof Hugo became a full professor in 1996, and chaired the Department for the period 2001 to 2004. In 2005, he did pupillage at the Cape Bar. After passing the Bar Exam he resigned from his chair at Stellenbosch Universitv and practised full-time as an advocate (as member of both the Cape Bar and the Johannesburg Society of Advocates (Maisels Group)) until 2012. During this time he appeared as advocate in the High Courts of Cape Town. Johannesburg and Kimberley, as well as in the High Court of Namibia, and the Supreme Court of Appeal. He also acted in several commercial arbitrations. During this period of legal practice he retained teaching responsibilities on contract basis with Stellenbosch University, and held appointments as extraordinary professor at the Universities of Stellenbosch and North West, Prof Hugo was appointed as Professor in Banking Law and Director of the Centre for Banking Law at the University of Johannesburg as from January 2013. He is a member of the Banking Commission of the International Chamber of Commerce.

Justice Yasmin Shenaz Meer

Yasmin Shenaz Meer holds the degrees BA (University of Durban Westville), LLB (UCT), LLM (University of Warwick, UK) and was one of the first judges appointed when the Land Claims Court was newly established in 1996. She is the most experienced judge at the Land Claims Court and is also the acting Judge President. Having completed her articles she joined the Legal Resources Centre as its first attorney in Cape Town. She was instrumental in establishing the Cape Town office where she practiced for 10 years. Thereafter she held the position of Deputy National Director of the Legal Resources Centre before being appointed to the bench in 1996. As South Africa has never before had a Land Claims Court the contributions of the early judges is truly ground breaking. Justice Meer's contribution to jurisprudence dealing with land reform generally and restitution, redistribution and tenure reform specifically are profound. Since 2012 she has also been the acting Judge President of the Land Claims Court.

Professor Jaap Spier

Jaap Spier graduated from Erasmus University (Rotterdam) in 1973. He was attorney at the Rotterdam Bar until 1977, lecturer of private law. Leiden University (1977-1981), company lawyer Unilever NV (1982-1989) and professor of private law, Tilburg University (1989-1999; after appointment in the Supreme Court parttime). From September 1997 to September 2016, he served as Advocate-General in the Supreme Court of the Netherlands (equivalent to Supreme Court Justice). He held an honorary chair at Maastricht University (1999-2016: currently emeritus). Since his retirement, he has held an honorary chair at the University of Amsterdam (from September 2016) and an extraordinary chair at Stellenbosch University (from 1 July 2016). Jaap is senior fellow Global Justice Program, Yale University. He received a PhD (Doctor juris), Leiden University 1981, Jaap is founder and honorary President of the European Group on Tort Law and co-founder (with Professor Thomas Pogge, Yale University) of an expert group working on climate change principles (this group launched the Oslo Principles; he served as rapporteur), and co-founder of the Expert group on Principles on Climate Obligations of Enterprises (reporter and author of the commentary). He is fellow of European Institute for Tort and Insurance Law (ECTIL), in Vienna. Jaap is (co-) author or editor of 29 books and

hundreds of articles and case notes on Tort law and legal aspects of climate change.

Professor Dire Tladi

Dire Tladi (BLC LLB cum laude (Pret) LLM (UConn) PhD (EUR)) is a Professor of International Law at the University of Pretoria. From 2006, he served as Principal State Law Adviser for the Department of International Relations and Cooperation and from 2009-2013 he was on assignment as the Legal Adviser for the South African Permanent Mission to the United Nations in New York. He is the Special Advisor to the Minister of International Relations and Cooperation since 2014, and a member of the International Law Commission. He has published many articles in peer reviewed journals and chapters in books, mainly in the area of international law.

Professor Andreas Van Wyk

Andreas van Wyk received his legal education cum laude at Stellenbosch University and at the University of Bonn in Germany (1960-1966). He also attended lectures at Besançon University in France during this period. He received his doctorate in law in 1976 from the University of Leiden in the Netherlands. In 1997, Leuven University in Belgium awarded him an honorary doctorate in law as recognition for his service to higher education and legal development. Thereafter (2007) he also obtained a BPhil degree in Ancient History at Stellenbosch University. Andreas van Wyk's career as an academic took him from senior lecturer to professor and dean of the Stellenbosch Law Faculty (1966 -1984). After a period of three years (1984-1987) as director general of Constitutional Development and Planning, during which he was actively involved in the preamble to the new South African dispensation, he returned to Stellenbosch as first Vice-Rector and then Rector

and Vice-Chancellor of the University (1991-2001). He is the author of three standard works on South African law and many articles on legal issues. He was also active in the business world as director of companies such as Boland Bank, Distillers Corporation, of which he was chairman, the Victoria & Alfred Waterfront, and Old Mutual South Africa, of which he was also chairman until the end of 2010. Since his resignation as Rector of Stellenbosch University, Prof Van Wyk has been active as a lecturer in and advisor on corporate law issues, with particular emphasis on corporate governance.
