It gives me great joy to add value to someone's life through my work. Creating an organized structure and seeing it take form out of a jumble of plans or words is immensely satisfying. I find learning new things very stimulating, like finding a new word and looking it up in one of my big heavy dictionaries.

What particular skills, talents and qualities are essential to be effective in this position?

The skills needed for any editor include a love of reading, attention to detail and a good grasp of the English language, punctuation, and grammar. Academic editors usually have a postgraduate degree and experience in the field for which the paper is written. To organize a symposium takes just over a year to plan and involves a lot of administrative duties. The person would need to be organized, good at recordkeeping, planning, contacting suppliers and following-up on queries.

What advice would you offer learners who are interested ir pursuing this career?

Start shadowing people from a young age to see what kind of work they do and if you would like the daily routine. Volunteer at as many types of companies during your holidays as a student. Start organizing events for a student association at your school or university if you think of becoming a symposium coordinator. If you are interested to work as an academic editor, I would recommend writing a thesis, enrolling in an editing course, and reading as many books as possible.
